Helping to Fight the Pandemic

On Wednesday I posted a couple of links on Dojo to apps which have been created to help fight the coronavirus pandemic. One was an app which tracks symptoms and helps the NHS build a picture of how quickly the virus is spreading and any more information about symptoms.

The second was an app which people can use to volunteer to support vulnerable people. By the end of the first day, more than 500,000 people had signed up to help deliver food and medicines, drive patients to appointments which cannot be cancelled and phone the isolated. Over the last few weeks, we have all had to adapt our lives in ways which would have been unthinkable a few months ago. The situation has changed so quickly, with the message changing from avoiding public places to only leaving home for daily exercise or essential work/shopping in a matter of days.

Ever since I became Head at Bunwell I have seen the importance of our community and this has never been more important or obvious as it is now. I enjoy my daily interactions with parents on the gate and the buzz of the school when the children and staff are there. We wouldn't be the school we are without the people.

An exceptional team of staff made changes quickly last week to switch seamlessly from classroom teaching to remote teaching. They adapted and worked together to ensure that the children in their classes were catered for and that the parents had the support they needed. It remains to be seen how long we will have to work like this, but we will continue to provide the work and support for as long as we do.

We will all take our time to adjust to this new normal; to establish routines at home and juggle the demands of childcare and working from home. We'll all need routines to get through this time, and those routines must include time and space to exercise and relax, to look after ourselves and our loved ones, to switch off and take breaks. We also need to think about keeping in touch to make sure we've not let anyone become invisible and isolated.

Whether it's a regular phone call or family chat (my family are trying Zoom to get us all 'together'), writing a letter to someone or waving out of the window to people on their daily exercise.

I have been hugely impressed by how the school community has adapted to this incredibly difficult situation while at the same time managing all the uncertainties which have come with it. We need that team spirit and community now and over the coming weeks and months.

Trust Update




