What we have been learning



Ladybirds: This week we have continued our Once Upon a Time topic by learning about the story of Cinderella. We have retold the story using pictures and designed our own glass slippers. In maths we have been working on counting an amount of objects accurately and representing numbers to 20 in different ways.

Hedgehogs: This week we have begun our new history topic about castles. In English we have continued our work on information books and have been learning how to use a contents and index page to find information. In maths Year 1 have been use base 10 resources to make and compare 2 2-digit numbers. In Year 2 we have been learning about fractions.

Badgers: Badgers have enjoyed coming back to school and have begun new topics across all subjects. We are learning about North America this term and the children have already been sharing their knowledge and experiences. In science we are learning about animals and their habitats. The children have enjoyed sorting animals and learning about the life processes of all living things.

Foxes: Foxes have made a flying start to the new term and are enjoying their English text: Beowulf, as well as their class reader: Holes. They are revisiting fractions in maths and have started their new science topic: Forces. The children were amazed to discover that two objects of identical size and shape but very different weight will hit the floor at the same time when dropped from a height!

Uniform

Now that we are in the summer term, children are welcome to wear their blue summer dresses if they would like to. Headteacher News

A week ago, Prince Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh died at the aged of 99 years old. It was reported when he retired in 2017 that he had undertaken over twenty-two thousand engagements and supported many different charities. One of his lasting legacies will be the Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme. It is said that his headmaster inspired the scheme which can be traced back to 1956.

Millions of teenagers have taken part in the award, myself included, which involves a set of challenges for young people; to help their community and environment, become fitter, develop new skills and complete an independent outdoor expedition. I am sure that there are members of our school community who have also completed different levels of the award and there may even be some older siblings who are currently taking part.

The award focuses on the local community and encouraging those taking part to get involved in their communities to make a difference and try new experiences as well as learning important life skills in a safe environment. The Duke of Edinburgh Award is aimed at teenagers, but as a primary school it is important that we try to give children new experiences and challenges. Over the last year, these have not been possible. I really hope that as restrictions begin to lift, we can incorporate more of these experiences into life at Bunwell.

We hope that we will be able to use the Day Legacy bequest to enrich the children's school experience. This money was left to us as Mr Day looked back on his school days fondly and want to use the money so that our children look back on their school days with the same fondness.

Trust Update


