What we have been learning



Ladybirds: This week we have really settled back into class. We have enjoyed playing with our friends and have been getting busy outside and inside. In maths we have been practicing our number recognition and number bonds to 10. In literacy we have been continuing to learn our phonics sounds, writing words and sentences with these and playing phonics games. We have also very much enjoyed using our new interactive whiteboard.

Hedgehogs: This week in Hedgehog class we have been working very hard on our information reports about animals found in the Arctic. We have used the Chrome books and have learnt how to insert photographs, change the font and colour on Google Docs. In maths Year 2 have been learning about 2D and 3D shapes and in Year 1 we have been focusing on place value.

Badgers: Badgers have made an excellent start to their return to school. We have been working on handwriting and pencil grip as well as getting back into a routine of reading each day. In maths we have recapped some of the work we did during lockdown and are now improving our times tables and basic skills. We are continuing our topic this week by making mosaics and learning about the decoration the Roman's used in their Villas.

Foxes: Foxes have been enjoying doing some practical experiments in science and spending plenty of time outside. In maths, we have been looking at coordinates, reflections and translations and we have been writing part of a story in English.

Headteacher News

Today marks one year since schools closed at the beginning of the first lockdown. The thought of schools closing was unprecedented (a word we have all used more in the last year than at any time beforehand), but the thought that a year on we would have been through a further two lockdowns is barely comprehensible.

I am enormously proud of what we have achieved as a school community over the last year. We have adapted to deliver the majority of our curriculum remotely, supported families' wellbeing and maintained communication with all stakeholders. Alongside all of this, school has remained open for key worker and vulnerable children.

Over the last year, we have learnt a huge amount about each other, the way we can work remotely and flexibly, what works in remote teaching and what doesn't!

Last Spring, we embraced home schooling with a sense of novelty and optimism that it would all be over by the summer. None of us dreamed that we would still be living with restrictions a year on. The latest (and hopefully last) lockdown was definitely more challenging. The expectations of home schooling and remote learning increased and the time of year added additional challenges.

It has been interesting to talk to the children about their experiences of home schooling and what they'll miss about it. Many children spoke of the enjoyment of spending more time with their families, becoming more proficient with technology and having more time to complete their work. Regular snack times also featured on the list! As they've returned to school they've spoken of the joy of spending time with their friends, having less distractions around them (apparently the temptation of Playstations/X-boxes etc was just too much at home!) and being taught by their teachers again.

Such dramatic change gives us all the opportunity to reflect and there will be aspects of the last year which we may introduce long term, video calls for example have become the norm and can make things more efficient. What hasn't changed though, is the fact that the children are our priority and making sure that they are happy and safe in school continues to be at the centre of what we do. Some will be finding the transition back to school more difficult than others and all will have had different experiences of lockdown. We will be living with the impact of COVID for a long time, but we hope that by providing the children with the familiar routine and structure of school that they will experience aspects of life which have been missing for the last year.


Trust Update
