What we have been learning



Ladybirds: Ladybirds have been working hard in phonics. Nursery have been learning initial sounds in words, Reception have been writing simple words and sentences with the sounds learnt. In maths we are learning about simple shapes such as circles and triangles. We have begun practicing our Nativity and are enjoying learning the songs.

Hedgehogs: Hedgehogs have been working on their addition and subtraction skills this week. In English we have been looking at the features of postcards before writing one from a seaside location. We have also been looking at what we might find at seaside towns as well as comparing different locations. We have started practising for the nativity and the children have been working hard on their lines.

Badgers: Badgers have been working hard this week on their addition and subtraction skills as well as times tables. We are also becoming journalists to learn to write newspaper reports in English. The children are excited about investigating incidents and writing a television report that we will film later in the term! Our book corner is nearly completed and we will share some photos of the children using it once it is finished!

Foxes: Year Six practised hard for the Remembrance Service and enjoyed performing in church. We are all very proud of how well they did. In maths, they have been learning about factors, multiples, prime numbers, squares and cubes and they have started their new class novel: 'The 1000 Year Old Boy,' in English. In science, they have also started a new topic: 'Properties and Changes of Materials.'

Headteacher News

Yesterday we held our traditional remembrance service in the church, the first to be held for two years due to COVID-19 restrictions. Thank you to Year 6 for leading the service.

My great-grandfather was born in 1876. He enlisted in the army as a young man, and served in India, being discharged as a sergeant after twelve years' service in 1906. On October 5 1914, he volunteered to re-enlist; he was already too old to have been conscripted when compulsory military service for the First World War was introduced. He served for four years on the Western Front. Now, he is only known through two First World War medals which had been passed down and a handful of grainy black and white photographs, in which he always appeared wearing a heavy suit, tie and hat. It's in the past few years that I have come to realize that there are any number of questions about his experiences, and those of countless others, to which we will never know the answers.


The guns fell silent at the end of the Great War at eleven o'clock on the eleventh day of the eleventh month of 1918. At the time, it was described as "the war to end all wars" because it was so destructive that the world's politicians seemed determined to prevent such a war from ever happening again. That hope was, of course, dashed. Our service on November 11th provided an opportunity to reflect on all these things and on others: on our family histories which are scarred by war and its aftermath.

Our PSHE topic this half term is called 'Celebrating Differences' whether that is differences between our families, our friends or our communities as well as recognising that these differences can sometimes lead to conflict. It is vital that we teach children how to resolve these conflicts reasonably and peacefully with the understanding that some level of conflict in their day to day life is normal.
