Ladybirds:

Ladybirds have begun their new topic of 'Once upon a time'. We have been focusing on traditional stories such as *Hansel and Gretel, Beauty and the Beast* and *The Shoemaker and the Elves.* Ladybirds have enjoyed learning about castles, the people who live in them and the reason they were built. <u>Attendance</u>

Badgers:

This week in Badgers we have been learning about the Royal Family and the Coronation. We have been using this information to answer questions and write information in paragraphs. In maths in Year 4 we have started our work on decimals and in Year 3 we have been reading scales and comparing weights. In Geography we are continuing our work on countries of North America and have been comparing different countries and their climates.

Foxes:

'Crime and Punishment' and have been referring back to periods of history they have previously studied to compare how law and order was maintained during those times. In maths, they have been covering topics within Statistics, including bar charts, line graphs and tables and, for Year Six, pie charts and finding the mean. In English, they have started their new class reader: 'Holes' and will be using this book as inspiration for some writing over the coming weeks.

Before and After School Club

Safeguarding at Bunwell

At Bunwell all staff have a responsibility to safeguard children. Headteacher Update

This week Y6 will be sitting their SATs in grammar, punctuation and spelling, reading and maths. We know how hard the children have worked and that throughout the year the tests have been at the back of their mind. Our SATs breakfast club has set them up for the tests, it is a good job that it is only for one week, the children nearly ate us out of house and home on Tuesday alone!

The SATs assess the children against everything they have learnt throughout the Key Stage 2 curriculum, not just content taught in Y6, it is a culmination of four years work. However, the tests do not assess children on what makes them special and unique. They do not assess the journey the children have taken to get to this point or the progress which they have made over the course of the year.

This particular cohort at Bunwell has always been unique. There are just seven children, in Reception they used to follow Miss Johnson like ducklings. While children have come and gone from the year, they have stuck stubbornly at seven children. The children know each other inside out and are each others greatest advocates and support. When one gets upset, the instinct of the others is to rush to their aid. Breakfast time this week has felt like a family affair—seven siblings eating breakfast around the table together.

As they sit their SATs, we must remember all of the other talents and skills which our children have. Whether it's a creative flair which sees them being able to turn a cardboard box into a superheroes shield, a love of board games, a seemingly endless appetite for new vocabulary and facts, a love of dance and creativity, being unbeatable in basketball or a great friend to all those around them. It is these aptitudes which we see at school and makes the children who they are.

Our jobs as teachers is to teach the children a broad and balanced curriculum, but it is also our jobs to nurture and develop their personal, social and moral education; teaching them how to be a good friend, how to resolve conflict and how to be a responsible member of society.
